


U.S. Employers Add 130,000 Jobs in August

Latino Unemployment Rate Returns to 4.2%



PROFESSIONAL AND BUSINESS SERVICES LEADS JOB GROWTH ADDING 37,000 JOBS

In August, professional and business services added 37,000 jobs. Latinos are underrepresented in the professional and business services sector, composing only 12.7% of workers.

Employment of Latinos in August 2019

The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) reported that employers added 130,000 jobs in August, a slight decrease from the 159,000 jobs added in July. Yet the national unemployment rate remained the same, at 3.7%. The number of employed persons increased by 590,000 to 157.9 million.

The Latino unemployment rate decreased slightly from 4.5% in July to 4.2% in August. The Latino unemployment rate is higher than the national rate of 3.7%. In August, Latinos saw a slight increase in those employed (+285,000) and a decrease in the number of unemployed (-98,000).

Despite high labor force participation, many Latino families continue to struggle to cover basic necessities. One contributing factor is insufficient wage growth, an important indicator of job quality and a key factor in economic security. Over the past year, average hourly earnings only rose by 1%, compared to the 3.5%–4% economists recommend for a healthy economy.

The following takes a closer look at Latino employment by gender and age:

- **Men (ages 20 years and older):** The Latino male unemployment rate decreased from 4% in July to 3.4% in August. The number of employed Hispanic men increased by approximately 169,000 between July and August.
- **Women (ages 20 years and older):** The unemployment rate for Latinas increased from 3.8% in July to 4.2% in August. The number of employed Hispanic women increased by 124,000.
- **Young Hispanic workers (ages 16–19 years old):** The unemployment rate for Latino youth decreased between July and August, from 17.6% to 14%.
